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Round 10 Wrap Up

THE GARY ABLETT MEDAL

Gary must have heard Lance Franklin had wrapped up his own medal up after his 13 goal haul down at Tassie. But his 50+ disposals weren't enough to carry his team home and not enough to take out the Gary Ablett Medal. Lance Franklin had 23 disposals (22 kicks and just the one handball), along with a career high 13 goals, to single handedly out score North Melbourne. He was hands down, the best player of the round and probably the best performance from one player all year.

THE ZAC DAWSON MEDAL

I'd have to give this one to Scott Thompson for being easily tagged out of the game by Ryan ' Gary's No.1 Fan' Crowley. He's been tagged all his career, he should have done better. He gathered 18 disposals at only 67% efficiency, resulting in a measly 58 supercoach points. Luckily, he had a brigade of midfielders around him to carry the work load. The likes of Dangerfield, Sloane, Vince and Van Berlo.

BROUGHT IN THE POINTS

This bloke is some what of a favourite of mine now. I brought him in when he was on the bubble after averaging 90 or so but hasn't showed me much after that. But after last weekend, he's shown what he could do from half back and from outside 50. I'm talking about my personal man-crush, Josh Drummond. Kicked 3 goals and gathered 26 disposals at a rate of 77% efficiency. Brisbane looked a much better side with him in and so does my Supercoach (not really but it sounded like a really good way to finish).

TRADE OF THE WEEK \leftarrow

Be sure to trade well this week according to your bye structure. But in saying that, don't chase a certain player just to avoid a donut for one round. As supercoach Confucius says 'Don't chase players for 3 weeks just to avoid bad scores'. Or as a SC guru once said would say 'Post bye round glory > bye round glory'.

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SARGE'S ORDERS 🍕

- How good was that game? The Tigers can play anywhere in Victoria. MCG, Etihad and was competitive at Simmonds.
- GWS were competitive again. That's all they need. Keep fighting and eventually those first half efforts will eventuate to full game efforts.
- North were disgraceful.
- At least we're seeing a change in Fremantle's game plan. More attacking footy.
- Wow! What a win! Melbourne deserved that. The raw emotions after the game was a sight to behold.
- That game was always a danger game for Carlton. Good win by Port Adelaide.
- Brisbane! What can I say?! Bloody amazing. They wanted it more.
- Sydney, just too good.
- Collingwood, the same. Good effort by GAJ.

THE ANDREW CARRAZZO MEDAL

The Andrew Carrazzo medal winner for this week is pretty harsh seeing as though he scored a decent score after being subbed but it would be my man Scott Pendlebury. This will help me get him into my side but a lot of debate has circulated through the community seeing as though he racked up an extra 16 points or so with the red vest on! As well as hurting everyone who have him in their sides (especially if you made him captain), he'll be hurting everyone in weeks to come. I'd be extremely surprised if he plays on Monday. He'd then have a bye which would be a minimum of 2 weeks but it is the tibia which may take longer to heal.

THE NAT FYFE MEDAL

The Nat Fyfe Medal winner this week for the most talk around town on twitter and the community is Steele Sidebottom and the choice many of us (including me) to make him our captains. Bad choice. Will never doubt Gary Ablett ever again.

SCHON'S BYE STRATEGY 🎘

There are a few simple things to remember to make sure that you cope the best that you can:

- Rounds 11, 12 & 13 are the bye rounds. Each AFL team has one week off in these weeks.
- Three trades are allowed each round to help cope with the six byes.
- The minimum amount of donuts (players scoring zero) that you can achieve isn't none, but two. WHY?
- The reason is pretty simple: Let's first ignore the ruckmen and assume that we can all field at least two ruckmen every round. Without ruckmen, there are 26 players in our SuperCoach squad.

Now we only have 6 bench spots: 2 in the defenders' line, 2 in the midfield and 2 in the forward-line.

Every player in your squad has to be on the bench at least once in the three rounds. We have 26 players who need to be on the pine at some stage, but with only 6 bench positions every round, mulitplied by three rounds (6x3=18), we have only 18 bench spots. We can trade three times in rounds 12 and three times in round 13, once the byes have started, ideally leaving us with six players who have already had the bye, therefore in our squad, only 20 players (26-6=20) need a bench spot.

It's all about limiting the damage.



Thanks to the 'Footynerd' bookmarklet, we can easily transform your SuperCoach side into an easy to read bye guide. (Below is an example back-line). I recommend this download to anyone who takes their SuperCoach seriously, it will save a lot of time. It can be found at <u>http://blog.footynerd.com</u>



In summary, key points to remember:

- Aim to have no more than 8 R11 players in your side by R11.
- Accept that you might have to cop a donut in R12
- Accept that you will have to cop donuts
- Minimise the damage!

FISH AND TIPS

The tips on what not to do are simple but need to be followed if you want to have success playing this game.

Don't forget to look at your teams, with the byes now upon us nearly everyone will have a doughnut or two coming. The trick is to minimise those nil scoring players either by trading, with three available per week, or by using your bench.

It will also be a time when top teams are willing to rest their stars with niggling injuries either side of the bye to give them a good rest. Don't forget to review the team changes and make sure your emergencies will play.

Don't make any trades at this time of the year just for short term gain that will need to be reversed in coming weeks. Think of the big picture. If you are playing a lowly ranked team in your league it may be best to hold your squad together and wait for a later round to make a trade.

If you have Gary Ablett in your side never have anyone but him as your captain. Sure there will the odd occasional freakish game like Buddy or Jack Riewoldt but you can almost bank on Ablett giving you 150 points every week.

Likewise if you have Pendlebury in your side, try to hold onto him. It's hard for those of us that are also trying to hold onto other injured stars such as Swan.

Maybe this week I will follow my own advice.

Who to choose each week as Captain, it's one of the most crucial decisions a coach can make, so we're here to make it easy for you to choose who to chuck the big 'C' on. The shiny-headed genius, Gary Ablett will not be included in this segment, he's going to be the best option, week in, week out, simple as that - we're not here to bore you. As it will always be, stats are as follows: (Season average, Projected score, average vs opponent, av at venue, last time they met)

1. Brett Deledio (122, 145, 113, 102, 117)

Lids, Lids, Lids... The man has just dominated this season after being injected in to the tigers midfield, adding a lot of speed and class in the centre. He hasn't scored under 100 this year and is set for another big one this week as he takes on Fremantle. Lids scored 117, 121 and 123 in his past 3 games against the Dockers and it looks like the trend will continue this week with the Tigers and Brett in fantastic form! Should be a safe bet this weekend!

2. Dane Swan (119, 135, 119, 115, 93)

Swanny will be back from injury this week to face Melbourne on Queens Birthday Monday. The Brownlow medalists output this year has been top quality as usual with a low score of only 92 coming in round 1. The second last time he met the Dees he scored a big 173 and in the absence of Pendlebury this week should step up! Dane should score very highly this week and give a great captains score, considering you held on to him for the last couple of weeks.

3. Nick Dal Santo (104,93,150,189,112)

Nicky Dal has probably had his worst Supercoach season in recent memory; he has only averaged 104 and had a low score of 46 against the Hawks in round 6. Despite his low numbers, Dal is too good to stay down for too long. The Saints are playing the Suns this week and last time he

played them up on the Gold Coast he scored 189. He is bound to come out with a big score in the next few weeks and with the Suns being unable to control the pies midfielders last week it looks like it could be the same this week. Dal is a great option and a great POD as your captain, he could certainly be advantageous.

Roughie: Paul Chapman (107,133,110,113,112)

Paul Chapman has had a tough year so far but with an average score of 127 over his past three games it looks like he is beginning to hit some form. He averages over 110 against the blues and has scored over 110 in his past three games against them. He also loves playing at Etihad

averaging 113. You would have to be a very bold person to put the 'C' on Chappy

SPECIALIST STATS

As it is the first week of byes, the Specialist would advise you to avoid trading this week (hence the shorter article) and wait until rounds 12 and 13, as you are only transferring one of your donuts to a different round. However, if you are loaded on trades and are planning on just 'winging it' during the byes, we have put together a few potential trade prospects.

JUMP ON

Lance Franklin (HAW) \$575,200 – FWD

If you are one of the 34% of teams that do not have this freak of nature, what are you waiting for? A HUGE 236 points on the weekend amid 13 goals 4 in a best on ground performance should have been enough to sway your vote. If you followed the Specialist's advice last week and made Buddy your skipper you would be over the moon. Only needs a score of 33 to stay at his current price, but will most likely rise \$40k after this round, and another \$60k the round after that! He's not POD but a must have.

Jamie Elliot (COLL) \$106,600 – FWD A lively rookie who scored 106 points in the Pies' thrashing of Gold Coast. Was sub effected in his first game so, much like Zorko 2 weeks ago, we are yet to witness this 177cm forward's full potential. Projected to rise \$47k this week, a potential downgrade option to consider.

Jack Reiwoldt (RICH) \$452,300 –FWD Jumping Jack is back. His 187 would have been the talk of the round if not for Buddy's 236. Reiwoldt's breakeven is unbelievably low at -45 and has a predicted price rise of \$72 thousand! Jump on if you can afford.

JUMP OFF

Heath Scotland (CAR) \$506,900 – DEF/MID Out for the duration of the byes with a calf injury attained in the Blues' loss to Port. You will most likely cop 3 donuts so definitely trade unless you are low on trades or it affects your bye structure. When he returns, Scotland will have a breakeven of 127 which is unlikely considering 127 was his highest score of the year against the Pies in round 3.

INTERSTATE INQUEST 📣

This piece is a continuation of an earlier piece in a previous newsletter. Written by Damien Berry.

Now we have reached that point of the season where after ten rounds, we approach the three round bye cycle. So this is an appropriate time, to review some of the best, and lesser performed players from our friends, the non-victorian clubs.

Firstly, Adelaide. The Crows have begun the season in great fashion, losing only to the Hawks in Melbourne and the in-form Magpies, and sit third on the ladder (8-2). The players statistically contributing the most are the midfielders, Scott Thompson, Rory Sloane, and Patty Dangerfield. With forwards Kurt Tippett and Taylor Walker the next highest ranked Crows.

In terms of players performing statistically down on expectations, they include defender, Graham Johncock, and midfielders Richard Douglas, and Bernie Vince.

The Brisbane Lions, sit (4-6) after their stirring upset win over the Eagles last Sunday, and seem to be on the improve with a group of talented youngsters. As such they have many players flying under the collective radar, such as 2011 Best and fairest winner, Tom Rockliff, veteran ruckman Ben Hudson, midfielder Jack Redden, the evergreen Simon Black, and defender Jed Adcock.The only player on the radar in a collective supercoach form slump, is former Tiger Andrew Raines.

Fremantle, looked promising at 5-2, but three losses in a row, have caused the Dockers (5-5) to slip out of the top eight. The players that are performing best despite their form slump include, big Aaron Sandliands, utility Michael Johnson, skipper Matthew Pavlich, much maligned (in SC at least) defenders Greg Broughton, and Paul Duffield, with midfielder Michael Barlow.

While, on the flip side, David Mundy, and Hayden Ballantyne have shed thousands off their collective value, and it is best to steer clear.

Gold Coast, (0-10) remain the only winless side after ten rounds, and have disappointed as a rule this season. Naturally, the best player in the competition (142.3 av), Gary Ablett, leads the way for the Suns, especially after his record equalling 53 disposal performance, against the Magpies last Sunday. other Suns to look at this season, are surprisingly Jared Brennan (97.6 av), Harley Bennell, Sam Iles, and Dion Prestia. Disappointingly Michael Rischitelli has been far from his best this season, and tagger Joel Wilkinson has also plunged in price to this point,

GWS, (1-9) boast only their victory over the Suns to date, but have shown signs of their future success this season already. Their best performers in 2012 so far, include co-captains Callan Ward, and Luke Power, ruckman Jonathan Giles, and former Demons Tom Scully, and James McDonald. The only two players that

The Port Adelaide Power, (4-6) began their season with a win over the Saints, but their best performance was last Saturday Night with a nine goal thrashing of top eight contender Carlton. The players most responsible, for the Power's improvement, are midfielders Brad Ebert, the talented Hamish Hartlett, a rejuvenated duo of Danyle Pearce, and Kane Cornes, as well as gutsy defender Troy Chaplin. Surprisingly, skipper Domenic Cassisi, has lost the most value for the Power so far, with team-mates Justin Westhoff, and the enigmatic Travis Boak (does he want to come home) also underperforming.

Sydney, (7-3) appear hard to gauge, a wonderful 5-0 start has been followed with losses to Adelaide, Richmond, and St.Kilda, but punctuated by massive SCG wins over Melbourne and the Bulldogs.

Their clear star performer has been former Hawk, Josh Kennedy (124.4 av), and has been ably supported by youngsters Kieren Jack, and rising star winner Dan Hannebery, with veterans Jude Bolton, and Jarrad McVeigh also pulling their weight. The key still is sidelined games record holder Adam Goodes, who had begun the season so brightly before his injury. The poorer performers, for the Swans, have noticably been defenders Heath Grundy, and Rhyce Shaw, and of course the hyped up Sam Reid.

The West Coast Eagles lead the competiton, (8-2) entering the bye cycle, and would have remained a full game clear on top of the table, had they not suffered a shock loss to the Lions at the Gabba, on Sunday, As the league leader the Eagles thus have had many fine contributors this year, and the best include, young guns Luke Shuey, and Scott Selwood, the best ruck duo in the comp, Dean Cox, and Nic Naitanui, with defenders Beau Waters, and Shannon Hurn, along with their consistent star Matt Priddis. The Eagles who have had their wings clipped at this stage of the year, are interestingly also Matt Priddis (down \$154,000), midfielder Daniel Kerr, the Big Q, Quinten Lynch, and yes Dean Cox too (down \$100,600). It just shows how well the Eagles are rated when their better players are still shedding value.

To summarise, the interstate brigade, have some great value picks for the second half of the season, and many of these consistent performers, are selected in less than 30,000 Supercoach sides, so the point of difference is there, just waiting for you to take advantage of.

Personally, on my radar are Port's Hamish Hartlett, Eagle Luke Shuey, and Lion defender Jed Adcock. Best of luck to all, for the bye rounds, and also the remainder of the season.



Now that Pendlebury is out this week I will have him and Swan on the bench. Should I trade either of them? My Dad says no.


Building up to the big game against my Dad next week. I don't want to lose that one otherwise I will be yelling at him but if I win I will have a glorious time.
